Each year, **Western Colorado Alliance** engages at the State Capitol with our legislators on bills important to our mission and our membership. Through our Legislative Committee, we **track** dozens of bills, take positions of **support** or **opposition**, provide remote **testimony** as well as in person testimony, **call** our legislators, **write** emails, **engage** in a People's Lobby Trip from western Colorado to Denver, and keep our membership **up to date**. This scorecard focuses solely on our rural legislators and the votes they took on priority bills deemed important to **Western Colorado Alliance** and our mission to build communities across western Colorado that are healthy, just, and self-reliant.

The Bills We Tracked in 2019

HB19-1006

This bill increases grant funding through the Department of Higher Education for allocation to the State Forest Service for increased forest restoration and wildfire risk mitigation.



HB19-1113

This bill eliminates the self-bonding option for mining permits, and requires all reclamation bonds to include financial assurances sufficient enough to protect water quality including treatment and monitoring.

SB19-181

This bill prioritizes the protection of public safety, health, welfare, and the environment in the regulation of the oil and gas industry by modifying the oil and gas statute and by clarifying, reinforcing, and establishing local governments' regulatory authority over the surface impacts of oil and gas development.

4

HB19-1003

This bill increases the maximum size of a community solar garden from two megawatts to five megawatts. Additionally it expands customer access from "same or adjacent counties" to the entire service area of the utility they are subscribing to.



SB19-096

This bill requires state agencies to collect data around greenhouse gas emissions from polluting entities in our state, in order to inform policy on how to curb these emissions.

SB19-236

This bill renews the Public Utilities Commission for seven years and reforms it to take meaningful steps to address climate change. It codifies Xcel Energy's proposed carbon reduction target of 80% by 2030 & 100% by 2050 and it clarifies that the PUC has oversight responsibilities with Tri-State – which will help protect rural electric cooperative customers.

7

HB19-1261

This bill creates a framework for our state to reduce carbon emissions with a goal of a 50% reduction by 2030, and a 90% reduction by 2050.

HB19-1314

This bill creates a Just Transition office in the Department of Labor and Employment. This office will assist with benefits to coal transition workers to enable them to support themselves and their families, give access, education, and training for job transitions, and more. This bill also creates a just transition advisory committee to advise the director regarding implementation of the bill.

HB19-1132

This bill establishes a grant program in the department of education to encourage providers that are entitled to federal money for lunches for students to purchase food products from Colorado growers, producers, and processors.

SB19-010

This bill allows grant funding be used in schools for behavioral health care services including counseling, therapy, referrals to community organizations, and training for students and staff on behavioral health issues, including prevention, identification and treatment for substance abuse and disorders.

11

HB19-1004

This bill creates a framework for implementing a competitive state option for more affordable health care coverage in Colorado, specifically designed to benefit mountain and rural communities currently paying much higher health insurance costs.

12

HB19-1120

...addresses the high youth suicide rates in Colorado and allows youth 12 years of age or older to seek and obtain confidential mental health services from a professional. This bill also requires the Dept. of Education to consult with professionals as well as a youth advisory council when setting up a system of mental health standards across the state.



This bill would have prohibited the use of polystyrene by food establishments. Due to time loss at the end of the session, it never made it past its Senate Second Reading, and for that reason is not included in the scorecard to the left.






